Congratulations Orto!

You probably heard a lot of yelling coming from the school this week as students cheered for Orto 5/6Z in his televised 100m events at the State Athletics Carnival. Orto placed 1st in his heat, 3rd in the semi-final and 5th in the overall final. A very impressive result for a student who had not had a lot of athletics training prior to our school carnival this year.

COVID and Staffing

Wednesday 12 October marked our first (and only) day since December 2021, that all of the staff employed to work on any particular day, were present at school. Staff absences greatly impact on student learning programs, and how quickly things can get done. Your efforts in keeping our whole community healthy are greatly appreciated.

The Department of Education states that students and staff must stay home when they are sick. Students, staff and visitors should only attend school when they are symptom free. We strongly encourage all students, staff and visitors to follow the guidance issued by NSW Health. We will continue to send home students or staff displaying symptoms.

Anyone who believes they have been exposed to COVID-19 is strongly recommended to monitor for symptoms and test if they have any concerns, as well as wear a mask. We are continuing our COVID-smart measures and rapid antigen test kits for students, are available at the office, if requested by parents and carers.

Our school will continue to operate with our baseline COVID-smart measures in place throughout Term 4 to minimise transmission and keep our school open. This includes a combination of layered safety measures such as maintaining hygiene and cleaning practices, using rapid antigen testing (RAT) when experiencing symptoms, maximising natural ventilation, strongly encouraged vaccinations and strongly encouraging mask-wearing particularly when indoors and/or physical distancing is not possible.

Work around the school

It was hoped that the synthetic multipurpose court would have been completed over the last school holidays, ready for the new asphalt and retaining walls to be completed by the end of October. The heavy rain during the holidays, however, prevented progress and damaged the synthetic court base. To Jaewon's (the builder's) credit, the damage was repaired and additional drainage was added to prevent undermining of the synthetic court. The SRC students will be recommending outdoor furniture and equipment to be installed by the school.

In the meantime - Please be careful walking through the school from Wandella Road. If you have problems walking on uneven ground, please wait on the council footpath or use the Sylva Avenue gates.








Caroline and Trinity

Speech Program

We welcome Kate Romeo (a speech pathologist with Learning Links), to support our students and their teachers. Kate will work in the school each Thursday from 20 October until the end of Term 2, 2023. Kate will support our teachers in helping to screen students and/or identify and cater for students who require speech and language interventions. Kate will identify some students with whom she will work in a short-term capacity in small groups, and also work in classrooms with the teachers.

If your child has a speech pathologist, it is important that you continue with these lessons. This program is completely different, and it will not take the place of your private or NDIS funded speech pathology visits.

Important Information from the School Office

The end of our school year is fast approaching, and we still have some families who have not finalised payment for this year's online subscriptions and resources. Invoices have recently been sent out to those families who still have outstanding balances to date.

We are continually mindful that many of our families were left in financial difficulty due to COVID. Therefore, we have only asked our families to pay for online subscriptions, school magazines, textbooks, and art projects this year. We have not requested any voluntary contribution, as we ordinarily would.

These costs enable your children to access additional resources at school and at home, for example, the magazines and textbooks become the property of the students. Online subscriptions are very costly for the school, and we cannot afford to cover these costs each year. We ask that you endeavour to meet these costs and we are happy for families to pay off these expenses throughout the school year.

Please endeavour to pay your balances before the close of our financial year, 30 November 2022. If you would like to discuss anything related to the payment of these expenses, please contact Mrs Williams, in the school office, or Mr Duffy.

Breaking News!!!

An earthquake has struck Miranda PS. Can the Stage 3 students work quickly enough to rescue Mrs Rigava from the rubble? Can they learn enough to create an earthquake resistant building?









The students in Stage 3 met with disaster upon arrival at school on Monday morning. Something terrible had occurred. The school was hit by an earthquake, with debris and smoke everywhere. Worst of all, we could not find Mrs Rigava. The students started a search mission and were successful in locating her within the debris, and extracting her safely to begin learning again. Here are some of their stories. They were inspired to write about the situation.

Amy:

The day was normal. Nothing was out of the ordinary. It was one of the nice sunny days that rarely come and I was at the office stapling a piece of paperwork. I walked to the printer to pick up more paperwork when a shake approached from the ground. I panicked and looked at my surroundings. Scared. Panicked. Frozen. I couldn't move, then suddenly the shaking became bigger, things around me were falling and breaking. I tried to run but I collapsed. The only way I could get to safety was to crawl to get under a desk. People around me were screaming while I was in shock cause minute by minute the earthquake started to shake more and more. Then while we were clutching on with all our might the earthquake stopped. I stood up as I breathed in the smoke that filled the air. The last thing I did was go to the others. I will never forget this.

Caleb:

The room was filled with fog that looked really blurry. The cracks were really easy to see from any corner of the room. On the wall, bright yellow coloured tape which said "caution" on all the sides. Chairs were flipped all around the room like there was a recent robbery. There were barely any earthquakes or even any disasters in Australia yet this caused a lot of damage. The floods were a small case compared to this. Black debris fell from the roof and the "inspiring" sentences on the wall were ripped off. It would take time and money to fix a mess like this. The colourful mat was now grey and dark. Our teacher "Mrs Rigava" almost died in the accident . The smoke smelled like overcooked pancake which spread to every corner of the room. It was like a fire but less harmful.

Preet:

Cracked windows. Fallen tables. Caution tape drooping everywhere. This place has lived a whole century, two decades and eight years. The smoke snaked down my lungs, poison slowly spreading. Lifeless. Doors slamming because of angry wind and confused officers. Panicked screams echo through the weak, crumbling walls. I didn't know that an earthquake could hurt like this. The lights flickered faster than ever. More echoing screams. The fans above our heads rumbled and shook and slowed down, as if tired of shaking. Then they spun faster. We all screamed in unison. Eerie thunder boomed and faint lightning flashed behind the clouds. The huge Mac was on the floor, glass and cables everywhere. Then came another scream. Fire!

Rares:

It was terrible. Everything was destroyed and there was caution tape on the remaining doors and windows. Most of the windows were broken and there was glass on the floor. The desks and chairs were turned over. There were people screaming, panicking and running around like crazy. Nobody could see anything because of the smoke that was spreading everywhere. It blinded anyone who was in the room so people were tripping and falling as they tried to escape. When the smoke cleared everyone could see what had happened. Some people made it out alive while some didn't.

Matias:

One Monday, just before school started, the teachers were setting up the classroom for the rest of the day, when they heard a low rumble that seemed to be coming from below them. At first they thought that it was the builders on the playground using a jackhammer to loosen some dirt, but when they looked outside, the fenced off area was only populated by a few birds pecking at the ground. Too late, they realized that they were in bigger danger than they thought earlier. It was an earthquake.

The walls surrounding them started to crumble. Dust was falling from the ceiling, and within minutes, the school was transformed into a field of debris that barely left the people inside alive. Fortunately, there were no deaths, but people were still hurt. An earthquake like this was unheard of in Australia, since it was right in the middle of a tectonic plate, so the teachers could only imagine how New Zealand and other countries on the ring of fire would be right now.

Madeleine:

I started to panic. My heart pounded. Screams are echoing in my head. As I start looking around... "BOOM!" "AHHHHH". I rushed inside the school to grab my belongings... As I'm on my way out to the playground to join everyone else, I hear the roll call. The teacher calls out my name. I scream and scream for help to get outside... no answer. Once I finally get to the exit I pushed the door... "NOOOOOO!" It was locked. I started to call for help as the earthquake escalated. The ground was shaking rapidly. The wall cracked open. The teacher was repeatedly calling my name. She got no response. I decided there was only one way out... A million thoughts rushed through my head. I thought about it for a minute... there was no other possible way to get out. I started to inhale smoke. I thought of all the good moments in my life. It could end in the blink of an eye but this was my only choice...

Monika:

CRASH!!! A Fan fell onto the table, screams of children ran across the room, some kids ran under tables. The couches fell down, people panicked as they ran across the room, the monitor fell down, and it crashed. Some kids didn't notice it because they stepped on it or tripped over it. A loud thud and shatter echoed across the room, the windows shattered and a whiteboard fell down, this was CHAOS.

Intention to apply for Year 7 placement in a selective high school in 2024

Dear Parent/Carer

Selective high schools cater for academically gifted students with high potential who may otherwise be without sufficient classmates at their own academic standard. Selective high schools help these students to learn by grouping them with students of similar ability, and by using specialised teaching methods.

If you would like to have your child considered for Year 7 selective high school entry in 2024, you need to apply on the internet using a valid email address (not the student's email address).

Detailed instructions on how to apply and the link to the online form will be available in early-October 2022 at https://education.nsw.gov.au/public-schools/selective-high-schools-and-opportunity-classes/year-7.

Applications open on 18 October 2022 and close on 16 November 2022. You must apply before the closing date.

You must submit only ONE application for each student.

The Selective High School Placement Test will be held on Thursday 4 May 2023.
