Cronulla Zone hats and jumpers may be worn on Fridays, but not throughout the week.


If you have any school uniforms at home and no family or friends to pass them down to, please consider donating them to the school.

School Times and Attendance Reminder

Just a reminder to families that students need to stay with their teachers until the 3:10pm bell.

Please do not make appointments during school time unless they are necessary and cannot be made out of school hours. This includes NDIS support services who should respect the importance of your child's uninterrupted education.

Any time your child is away from school, please send in a written note (preferably on paper or by email for our records) on the first day that your child returns to school. If your child is away from school for more than one day, please phone the school so we know your child is safe. If you child is away due to sickness for more than two days, or has a lot of absences due to sicknesses, a doctor's certificate is required.



Unwell at school

Any student or staff member who is unwell and/or displays symptoms of COVID-19 will be asked to go home and stay there until they can complete a RAT or PCR test.

- If symptoms continue, they should stay at home and take another RAT in 24 hours or have a PCR test.
- If the second RAT or initial PCR test result is negative and they are displaying no symptoms OR they are diagnosed as another condition such as hay fever, the student or staff member can return to school.

- In NSW, positive COVID-19 cases are provided with a Medical Clearance Notice after 7 days and allowed to leave self-isolation as long as they do not have COVID-19 symptoms.
- If your child suffers from a sinus or allergic condition (e.g.: hay fever), please provide the school with a letter from your doctor. This will save possible embarrassment for everyone.
- If your child or a family member tests positive to COVID-19 please inform the school and follow the <u>current health advice</u>.

Close contacts attending school

Students and staff who are close contacts and have no symptoms may continue to attend school if they follow guidelines agreed with NSW Health. Close contacts will not be permitted to enter the support unit (including Assisted School Travel Program) and will be supported to continue learning or working from home where possible.

Note that staff and students who have had confirmed COVID-19 in the last 12 weeks do not have to comply with the following guidelines if they become a household or close contact and are not required to self-isolate or test unless they develop new COVID-19 symptoms.

Close contacts attending school will need to adhere to the following in addition to the <u>NSW Health guidelines</u>.

They must notify the school if they are intending to return under this provision.

They should conduct a daily RAT and return a negative result each morning before attending school for 5 school days.

Primary school students are recommended to wear a mask indoors (if this is possible - except when eating or exercising).

No student or staff member identified as a close contact will be permitted to participate in overnight excursions, including school camps.

Any visitor to a school site who is a close contact is required to advise the school that they are a close contact before they come on site. These visitors should conduct a daily RAT and return a negative result before attending. They must also wear a mask indoors at all times. Schools should consider if the visit can be conducted virtually.

Students and staff at greater risk of serious illness, if they were to contract COVID-19, should speak with their health care professional to review their health support plan or COVID-19 action plan and speak with the school about any local considerations.



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STOP WALK TALK anti-bullying strategy

Dear Parents and Caregivers,

We are proud of our students' behaviour and attitude towards being safe, respectful and responsible learners. Our school rejects all forms of bullying behaviours, including online (or cyber) bullying by maintaining a commitment to providing a safe, inclusive and respectful learning community that promotes student wellbeing. All staff are committed to establishing evidence-based approaches and strategies that promote a positive climate where bullying is less likely to occur.

Our ongoing data would suggest that bullying is not a major issue at Miranda Public School and that any matters that do arise are dealt with promptly and effectively.

However, as part of our ongoing commitment to best practice in student welfare, Miranda Public School has introduced an anti-bullying plan which involves a strong focus on teaching all students strategies to use if they feel they are being bullied.

The NSW Department of Education Anti-Bullying Plan for Schools defines bullying as: "intentional, repeated behaviour by an individual or group of individuals that causes distress, hurt or undue pressure".

Bullying is not an argument between children where both children are upset or something that only happens on occasion.

Bullying can be:

- verbal eg: name calling, teasing, abuse, putdowns, sarcasm, insults, threats
- physical eg: hitting, punching, kicking, scratching, tripping, spitting
- social eg: ignoring, excluding, ostracising, alienating, making inappropriate gestures
- psychological eg: spreading rumours, dirty looks, hiding or damaging possessions, malicious SMS, social media posts and email messages

All staff members teach students a self-managed, school-wide response to put-downs, aggressive behaviour and bullying. This strategy is designed to empower the students - to give them a simple way to immediately deal with put-downs, aggression or bullying behaviour. In addition, anti-bullying lessons are proactively taught in all classrooms.

Your support in discussing this strategy at home with your children will help to reinforce the practice we are trying to establish at school. It might be useful to talk with them about why it is wrong to tease, torment or hurt others.

Thank you for your ongoing support of our school initiatives and programs.

The Stop Walk Talk Strategy:

If they are feeling put-down, verbally or physically bullied, students are to:

Step 1: Hold up their hand and assertively say:



STOP

Step 2: If the 'bullying' does not stop students are to **WALK** away.



Step 3: If the 'bullying' still does not stop, students are to **TALK** to a teacher.



NB: If any child is in danger or is being physically hurt they are taught to go straight to a teacher.

If another student tells them to "STOP" or "WALKS AWAY", this is a sign that the other student feels put-down or bullied. The students must:

- stop what they were doing.
- take a deep breath and count to 3.
- "get on with their day", even if they disagree.

The students are also being encouraged to help a friend to walk away if they see that friend being put-down or bullied. The students are being taught that good friends look after each other and it is not acceptable to just stand and watch when they see someone else being put-down or bullied.
